Ministers' Message

Rev. Axel Gehrmann

This year the beginning of summer, June 21, coincided with the first day of our annual UU General Assembly (GA), which took place in Pittsburgh, PA. For the past 35 years or so, attending GA has been a cherished tradition for Elaine and me - an opportunity to gather with hundreds of our ministerial colleagues, and thousands of UUs from congregations across the country and around the world, to experience and join in shaping the direction of our larger movement.

One important event this year was the election of a new UUA president. Our past president, Susan Frederick-Gray, did an exceptional job providing wise and compassionate leadership over the past six years, especially throughout the pandemic. This year, we elected Sofia Betancourt to serve for the next six years. At GA I was able to hear her speak at several events, and was very impressed by her depth and clarity of vision. If you are unfamiliar with both our outgoing and incoming presidents, I encourage you to learn more about them. The UU World Magazine, or www.uuworld.org is a good resource.

Another important event, was the vote to move forward with the process to further discuss proposed changes to Article II of the UUA bylaws – which includes a revision of the seven UU principles that were first adopted in 1984. In the course of several business meetings, with thousands of delegates in attendance, ideas, opinions, and potential amendments were discussed, several of which were adopted. If you have not yet read about the proposed Article II, as well as the process and timeline of its creation, I encourage you to do so! You can find lots of information at www.uua.org. A final vote on the proposed changes will take place at next year's GA, in June 2024, and will require a two-thirds majority to pass.

The various discussions and votes at GA were incredibly exciting and engaging. Participating in a

process of thoughtful deliberation and decisionmaking that involved countless leaders and thousands of voting delegates was fascinating - many different points of view were represented! For me, it was interesting to see that none of the votes were unanimous, and heartening that all business items approved were adopted by substantial supermajorities. A fine example of our treasured democratic process at work!

Several worship services we attended were inspiring and uplifting, and one presentation that remains with me is the talk by the award-winning author Brian Broome, who spoke about his memoir "Punch Me Up to the Gods."

Both Elaine and I left GA with a renewed sense of the relevance of the religious and moral message UUism offers, a vision of love and justice that is desperately needed in our troubled world. As the proposed UUA bylaws put it: the purpose of our movement is "to actively engage its members in the transformation of the world through liberating love."

The purpose of our larger movement is very consistent with our own stated mission at UUCMP: to join together "with loving hearts and open minds... we change ourselves as we change the world."

We look forward to continuing this transformational work with you in the days ahead. We look forward to seeing many of you at our Ingathering and Water Communion Service on August 20. (Please remember to bring along a vial of water from your summer travels or activities.) And we hope you will consider joining our Annual All-Church Campout at Big Sur, from August 25-27 – which is a highlight of our congregational summer activities!



I was voted to the Board in 2021 and will serve as president this year, and I am pleased to be here serving with you in my California "church home."



Corey Brunson sent out a survey to our teen participants in order to get their input about what topics they would like to cover in class. Some of the topics voted on were: Anatomy/Physiology, Sexual Harassment, Contraception/STIs, Safer sex/Masturbation, Gender Roles & Identity/Sexual Orientation.

We will be offering two levels of OWL starting in the Fall. We will offer an OWL class for 5th and 6th graders and another class for 7th and 8th

graders. We have never offered two levels of OWL at the same time in the history of UUCMP but it is an important



program and aspect of RE. OWL is also a way we bring in new families to our church. It takes a big effort from our Committee on Family Ministries and volunteer teachers to put this together. We are working to make it possible for our youth and for other families around the community.

We are also still continuing our summer curriculum from Soul Matters "Can Do Summer." Some of our lessons include making an obstacle course outside, toothpick architecture, creating junk sculptures, and doing body percussion.

We are in search of a nursery assistant to hire. Please contact me or Sharyn if you or anyone you know who would like to know more information about this position.

As you know, Jill Marshall was working on the Emerson room downstairs as her Eagle Scout final project. We are excited to say it is now -- continued on page 6

The Parenting Connection of Monterey
County

The Parenting Connection of Monterey County's (PCMC) mission is that all families in Monterey County benefit from equitable access to resources that reduce stigma, eliminate barriers, and provide support towards building positive parent-child interaction and family wellness through education and programming from pregnancy to age five. When caregivers are effectively supported, families thrive and children flourish.

PCMC provides free, bilingual, culturally responsive Maternal Mental Health support services in East Salinas and South Monterey County. Our services include a postpartum warmline where families can connect to our services, be referred to other services in the community, and receive paraprofessional counseling support. Additionally, we offer Family Circles in nine locations in the county through which families receive evidence-based guidance and



support to strengthen the caregiver-child relationship as well as a safe space to receive mental health support during the perinatal year. PCMC is also working to establish a peer-to-

peer network of trained community members with the goal of establishing support circles throughout the county. Additionally, Circle of Security Parenting and Childbirth Education series are offered quarterly. PCMC provides regular community outreach and service provider training as well. PCMC is a proud member of the Maternal Mental Health Task Force and is heavily involved in countywide efforts to support Maternal Mental Health programming, advocacy, and education.

PCMC is an emerging nonprofit that, like many others, barely survived through the pandemic. However, we have emerged stronger and have grown exponentially in the past two years, hiring staff and expanding our services within the county. Studies have shown that mental health is a crisis in this country, and the limited data suggest that 1 in 5 women experience perinatal mood and anxiety disorders (PMAD), commonly referred to as postpartum depression; however there is evidence to suggest the actual statistic is likely higher, certainly among more vulnerable populations. We appreciate your gift which allows us to continue our existing work, and also to strive to meet the unmet demand for our services and programming. We are a visionary organization, and we invite you to join us as we partner and innovate in new and exciting ways to serve our families.

"Journey to the Mystic East"

July 28 – September 24, 2023

Photographing indigenous cultures has been a lifelong passion of mine. The advent of modern technology and globalization has created rapid changes in every culture on the planet including those presented here which include Tibet, Nepal, Burma, India and Bali. The Buddhism and Hinduism practiced in these countries help to maintain their historical traditions as they transition into the modern world.

I have been photographing in the Himalayas and Southeast Asia for the past 38 years and have witnessed rapid change. Many of the images presented here could not be captured today and are now part of the historical record. For example, the yaks crossing the Lar Geh pass in Tibet are carrying salt in hand loomed sacks which is no longer a form of livelihood in Tibet. My goal is to make the

world more harmonious by showing the common humanity amongst all people.



In recent times, the Dalai Lama and other teachers have brought Buddhism to the West for the benefit of all sentient beings. Padmasambhava, the saint who brought Buddhism to Tibet in the seventh century, predicted this: "When the iron bird flies and the horse runs on wheels, the Tibetan people will be scattered like ants across the face of the earth, and Dharma will come to the land of the red man." When the hippies traveled overland from Europe to India and Nepal, they encountered Hindu saints and brought back teachers who introduced yoga, meditation, and mystic practices to the West. These ancient wisdom traditions have had a strong influence in creating a better understanding amongst our differ-

ent cultures. As Mark Twain once said, "Travel is fatal to bigotry, prejudice and narrow mindedness."

I photograph in both color and black and white. I prefer black and white for people as it removes the distraction of color, inviting the viewer to see the human spirit and emotional content within the image. However, color is closer to the reality we experience through our vision, and it allows the viewer to imagine being there. There is also a series of colorized images. Starting with a black and white image, I carefully select areas to add a color and then print them on watercolor paper to enhance the visual effect. All photographs are printed and matted with archival materials.

I am often asked how I can capture genuine moments of human emotion when photographing. I do this by always approaching people with respect, sensitivity, and integrity. This is possible even without a common language as 90% of communication is nonverbal. Once this is established either through eye contact, body language or words, then I proceed to pick up my camera. It is my hope that my photographs create a sense of common humanity and foster understanding and acceptance amongst all the tribes of the human family.
