Ministers' Message

Rev. Elaine Gehrmann

With the many troubling and scary events in the world—acts of violence, environmental crises, and more-- I know that many of us find ourselves with short fuses, easily moved to anger or tears, distracted and unmoored. We often respond to others with knee-jerk emotions rather than thoughtful principled positions. It can be hard to give or to get the type of responses we are craving, and hard to know how to help those close to us with their struggles.

A recent reprint in the New York Times really struck a chord for me this week — an April, 2023 article by Jancee Dunn, entitled, "When Someone You Love is Upset, Ask This One Question." Ms. Dunn recounts the advice of her sister, who is a special education teacher in upstate New York. Her sister said that when a student gets emotionally overwhelmed, she and her colleagues have discovered that it is really helpful to ask, "Do you want to be helped, heard, or hugged?"

I love this, a variation on the 'love languages' approach by Dr. Gary Chapman (https://uucmp.org/services/love-languages/), but simplified for easy access (and alliteration)—"Do you want to be helped, heard, or hugged?" Ms. Dunn said this advice has been useful in her own personal relationships as well.

Asking this important question helps us avoid assuming that we know what the other wants or needs in that moment. It gives them a sense of control and agency, and makes clear that we are more concerned with meeting their needs than asserting our own. We're asking for their permission, and offering to meet them where they are, a clear sign of our empathy and compassion.

We might also consider offering our own response, when someone is approaching us about

our upset. They may not know to ask the question, but we could volunteer the answer none-theless, "I just need to be heard/helped/or hugged right now." This can help with our own frustration or sadness, by increasing the odds that the person offering help can direct it in our desired direction.



In the coming weeks, I invite us all to try to keep this invaluable question in mind, when interacting with our friends and loved ones, when we or they are upset and troubled. "Do you want to be helped, heard, or hugged right now?" And then let us do our best to act accordingly.





Is it complex enough that you discover new things when you enjoy it over the years? I think most of us are creative in some way. I am creative with paint while others are also creative in making an environment that is a form of self-expression and source of comfort. It makes me happy when my art helps to complete the room.

One collector asked to see a green painting, but when I showed her an abstract called "Lifeline" she burst into tears. I would not let her take it because I knew the right match for her would come along, work with her room, and cause no tears. This painting went to a collector who thought it felt uplifting and made her



My work is largely intuitive with each stroke suggesting the next until we see balance and harmony. The painting tells me when something is needed and when it is done. Then I

sleep on it and wake up knowing its name. Starting with the name is too restrictive.


The Worship Associates at UUCMP bring a variety of experiences and perspectives to our weekly services!

We have a new recordkeeping system, Breeze, that will allow us to do the campaign easily online, and reduce mailing costs. Those of you who receive the newsletter by U.S. mail will continue to get the pledging packet by mail. But people are encouraged to pledge online.

The Stewardship Committee met in mid-October to discuss what our theme will be for the upcoming campaign, but we are still working on it. We want to emphasize how UUCMP continues as a beacon of love, justice, and equity and need a cogent brief tagline or slogan that does that. Suggestions are most welcome.

We are looking forward to a successful campaign, with larger pledges (larger than last fiscal year) from as many of us as can manage so that we are able to continue to fund all the activities and employees of the church. We did raise \$8,500 with our COVID Angels fundraiser! Thank you to all of you who donated. So many Angels in our midst. Thankfully, we're all angels in fact! We hope you enjoyed the cake to celebrate Angels on October. 22.

Even with the extra \$8,500 from the Angels campaign, we have not yet raised enough money to make up the difference between our budgeted needs and our income (as explained at our Annual Meeting). We sure don't want to face having to cut something out of our activities or cut hours for employees.

At our Stewardship meeting in October, we learned from Church Treasurer, Robert Brunson, that pledges for the current pledge year (July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024) are coming in slower than usual. If you need to CHANGE your pledge, please let us know. EVERY PLEDGE MATTERS. We count on every penny of every pledge to make our budget. The Finance Committee expects our pledges this coming campaign will completely fill our coffers without having to dig into our decreasing savings. It's our beloved church. It's up to all of us to keep it thriving.



After our Climate Conversation event in Sep-

tember, we discussed the next steps we want to take to keep learning and taking action about climate change. We decided to meet after church on the second Sunday of each month at noon to learn more



At our first gathering, Sunday, November 12, we plan to watch a recording from the coordinators of the UU Green Sanctuary 2030 Program. We will watch a video called "Surprise Lessons in Congregational Transformation" in which members of the Ann Arbor, Michigan UU church share numerous ways their churches are engaged with climate change. We hope to learn more about the Green Sanctuary 2030 program and get ideas about how we might engage in this process at our church.

We also are looking forward to taking action together with the Climate Action Now smartphone app. With this app, an individual can take five meaningful actions in five minutes. Think about what we could do if say, 20 of us used the app together for 30 minutes! In one short session, working together, we could send perhaps 500 emails to legislators and decision-makers about important climate change legislation and other actions!

5 cups shredded zucchini

10 large eggs, lightly beaten

2 tablespoons butter
1 cup finely chopped onion
Pinch of salt, plus ¼ teaspoon, divided
1 ½ cups corn kernels, fresh or frozen (thawed)
1 ¼ cups cottage cheese
1 cup crumbled feta cheese
½ cup chopped red bell pepper
¼ cup chopped fresh dill
1 tablespoon all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
¼ teaspoon ground pepper

Directions:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Coat a 9 x 13-inch baking dish with cooking spray.

Place squash on a clean kitchen towel; gather up the edges and squeeze out excess moisture.

Heat butter in a large skillet over medium heat. Add onion and cook, stirring occasionally, until golden brown, 5 to 8 minutes. Add the squash and a pinch of salt, cook until very soft and dry, about 4 minutes more.

Transfer the squash mixture to a large bowl. Add corn, cottage cheese, feta, bell pepper, dill, flour, baking powder, pepper, and the remaining ¼ teaspoon salt and stir until well combined. Stir in eggs. Pour the mixture into the prepared baking dish.

Bake the casserole until the center is set and the edges are lightly browned, about 40 minutes. Let stand 10 minutes before serving.

Affordable Housing at UUCMP


There have been changes in California, recently signed into law, that allow housing as a matter of right on church property. Studies by the Terner Center for Housing Innovation at Cal Berkeley have estimated that there is enough land owned by California churches to accommodate all the state's affordable housing needs. Further it's land generally situated in areas where you would want affordable housing with clean air, access to services, low crime, ease of transportation.

At the Strategic Planning Session held recently at our church, there was a high degree of interest in exploring the possibility of building affordable housing on our church property.

A small informal group has begun to meet to explore the feasibility of such development. We are still at the initial phases. There will be plenty of opportunities ahead for thorough discussion by the congregation and church leadership as to whether this is a path that would help fulfill the church's mission.

Below is a diagram of the church property and its development. If you are interested in learning more, this topic is on the agenda of the Social Justice Committee which meets November 5th at 12 noon in the Sanctuary and via Zoom. We will have a nonprofit housing developer present and a representative of COPA to talk about affordable housing development at other churches in the Central Coast area.
