Ministers' Message

Rev. Axel Gehrmann

The other day when Elaine and I were taking a late-afternoon walk along the shore, a surprising sight caught my eye: a small burst of color poking out between the clouds near the horizon where the sun would soon set. It looked like a tiny slice of a rainbow, which was puzzling, because the day was dry - far and wide not a drop of rain.

Elaine knew what we were witnessing: an atmospheric optical phenomenon called a "sun dog." A quick bit of research revealed that sun dogs often appear in pairs, on both sides of the sun within a 22 degree halo. (Upon closer inspection I noticed there were two colorful spots in the sky.) Sun dogs are a kind of halo caused by the refraction of sunlight by ice crystals in the atmosphere. "They can be seen anywhere in the world during any season, but are not always obvious or bright." – Who knew?!

I had never noticed a sun dog before. Seeing this one seemed like a good omen – and like its relative, the rainbow – a beautiful celestial symbol of hope. This remarkable miracle of light was an unexpected and auspicious revelation.

"Be the Light!" is the motto of this year's Stewardship Drive. Perhaps you have seen some of the articles and announcements from our Stewardship Team, or heard testimonials on Sunday mornings. Once again, our Stewardship Team is working hard to help us all think about our financial support of UUCMP, encouraging us to be more generous. (If you have been reading reports from our Finance Committee, or attended the Financial Forum in late January, you know that a significant increase in contributions is needed this year, if we want to maintain current programming and staffing levels. Our Stewardship logo this year is a lighthouse - a

beacon of light that keeps us safe and sustains us. It is a light of hope that can guide us and help us find our way in the world, especially in dark and troubling times. I think the lighthouse is a fitting symbol for our church - what we provide and stand for, and what we offer the larger community.

The light we provide, as we put our UU faith into practice, is profound and precious! Every one of us contributes to the light of our caring community – when we gather for worship or study or service; when we join in song and celebration; when we open our hearts and tenderly share the joys and sorrows of our lives; when we extend helping hands; when we work for justice. Together, we can generate an amazing amount of illumination, and be much brighter than any single light alone.

I do believe UUCMP makes a real difference in the world. Our light may be small, and it is not always obvious or bright – but it is beautiful, and it is precious. UUCMP is a beacon of love and justice, an ally of countless similar efforts that can be seen anywhere and at any season – if only we open our eyes. May we each do our part, to ensure that our light continues to burn brightly.

RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION




Hello Everyone,

It's hard to believe it, but it's already time to start looking ahead to summer for RE programming and plans! As someone who still hasn't taken down their Christmas tree (though that's hopefully coming soon!) I'm not quite ready to consider summer yet! Nevertheless, at our last Committee on Family Ministry meeting, we discussed the possibility of hosting an environmental justice summer camp at church. While we still have many of the constraints we did last year (namely, the adult human resources needed to manage a week-long day camp), I am excited that there is still interest and momentum in serving our kids and our larger community with a child-focused program.

The strategic planning breakout sessions in January also inspired me, as I listened to others' ideas for how to further build and grow our RE program. From field trips to the UUA in Boston, to involving kids in activities with the social justice, environmental justice, and art committees, and so much more, it was encouraging to hear the interest and energy to engage our children, youth, and families! I believe it's the relationships that lead our kids and youth on their faith formation journeys, and I'm optimistic about the increased opportunities for our children to grow their relationships within our spiritual community.

As we head into February and our monthly theme of justice and equity, I'm looking forward to working with our RE community of kids and adults to learn more about how our faith calls us to be radically inclusive and justice focused. This past fall, when the kids were asked to consider how the 8 UU principles match up with the Article II proposed values, "Justice" was the value that our kids linked to the most principles. I'm encouraged that the kids so readily identified our faith's grounding in the value of justice and hope to explore how we can live out this value in our daily lives.

In case you haven't seen it, here is a picture of a mnemonic device of the Article II proposed values that we have in our RE classroom to help the kids remember what the values are: Justice, Pluralism, Interconnectedness, Gen erosity, Love, Equity, Transformation, aka J PIGLET.



The Village Project, Inc. was founded to help meet the needs of the under-served African American Community. Their services are based on community-defined practices. Prior to TVPI becoming a reality, focus groups were held with a myriad of community members, such as grandparents, social workers, therapists, relative caregivers, civic organizations, pastors and grassroots individuals. As a result of input from individuals in these focus groups, it was clear that the community wanted a place where Black people could go to work through the challenges they faced and do so with the help of trusted practitioners in the community who looked like them and understood their

community, they provide services to any individual or family in need. Additionally, providing services from one's cultural identity is paramount to the philosophy of the agency's board of directors, staff, founders and clinicians.

Paintings by Elizabeth Wrightman Feb. 2, 2024 – March 29, 2024

"Painting is stronger than I am", said Pablo Picasso. "It makes me do what it likes." Although that sounds a little dramatic for me, if not downright self- important, I regularly experience what Picasso is saying. Of course one cannot look directly at such a phrase, but might glimpse the

feeling many times, out of the corner of one's eye, and smile and nod one's head knowingly. ~Elizabeth Wrightman

Elizabeth will show in the Welcome Hall gallery February and March. She lives in Carmel with her husband Paul, pastor of the Community Church of the Monterey Peninsula, and they are both ordained in the United Church of Christ.

She would be described as an expressionist, with acrylics, house paint, pastels, often collage and often drawing a lot. She majored in fine arts at the College of Wooster in Wooster, Ohio, spending her senior year however at UCSB, still with a painting emphasis.

Working for the Dept. of Aging in Pittsburgh, PA then attending Pittsburgh Theological Seminary as they raised teenagers, she would paint and show maybe once year. She then became a pastor, and also a hospital chaplain.

Upon moving to the Monterey Peninsula 14 years ago Elizabeth experienced a call to full time work in the studio. She paints largely from Irish literature. (This led to an independent study of James Joyce, involving several presentations, beginning with Trinity College in Dublin, on Bloomsday.) Joining Joyce scholars from worldwide settings, Elizabeth was accepted to show her paintings from Ulysses, as the literary world celebrated 100 years since its highly controver-

sial publication.

Her work similar to dreams perhaps . . . alternates between the playful and the mysterious. A Celt by family origins, her family were Highlander Scots, but spent generations in Ireland. Elizabeth identifies more with the Irish imagination. At first puzzled to find poems and legends showing up center stage, as a source of subject matter, she eventually accepted it; it gave her complete peace, and a sense of homecom-

ing. If you look up the haunting poem, the Song of Amergin, you will know everything that she knows about what she paints. The Why, When, Where and Who can be explored in more depth, with a cup of coffee at a 'walk and talk' in the Welcome Hall.

BE THE LIGHT!

Be the Light is the theme for this year's operating fund drive which begins at February 18's worship service. (Stay after worship for a celebratory piece of cake.) We've already let you know the process will be different this time. Most of you will be contacted by email and will be asked to pledge ONLINE! Steve Johnson will be posting how to do this on the UUCMP website. He'll provide straightforward written directions, no doubt with pictures, to help you through the process. A steward may contact you to help you complete your pledge. Plus, after worship during the campaign, someone will be at the stewardship table every Sunday to help.

The UUMCP Board has challenged us to pledge **\$476,500** for the 2024-2025 fiscal year. That is a 25% increase over what we all pledged last year. The amount will allow us to preserve our current level of church staffing and operations. So, it is up to all of us, if that is what we would like to happen for UUCMP. It supports our ability to fulfill our strategic plan of

increasing the number of families with children, broadening our outreach to share our values in the community and expand membership, and increase the participation of all of us in the congregation. We will display a thermometer tracking our progress this year!

A group of Stewardship Committee and Board members have put up a challenge match of \$15,000. The match is for individual pledge increase over last year's level which:

A – Increases the pledge by 25% or more over their 2023-2024 pledged, or

B – Moves into the five percent of annual household income pledge group.

Let's work at "winning" the entire challenge by stretching to increase our pledges.

The important thing to remember is that every single pledge adds to our total. Some of us are very capable of increasing our pledge and/or getting to the 5% level. Others, not so much. The key is to pledge what makes you feel like you are doing all you can to help us reach our goals.

We ALL are the ones who will make a difference for UUCMP.

Reducing your consumption of beef, lamb, pork and chicken - even just a little - can significantly lower your climate impact and help preserve other precious natural resources. Fruits, vegetables, grains and other plant-based foods have a much lower impact, almost 20 to 1. Enjoy the climate and health benefits of eating green by trying out our monthly vegetarian recipes.

(SLOW-COOKER) CAULIFLOWER, POTATO, WHITE BEAN SOUP

INGREDIENTS

Yield: 6 servings

1 pound Yukon gold potatoes, scrubbed, peeled and cut into 1- to 2-inch chunks



1 pound cauliflow-

er, chopped into large bite-sized florets and stems

2(15-ounce) cans cannellini beans, drained

½ yellow onion, minced

3 garlic cloves, smashed and minced

3½ cups vegetable stock

3 tablespoons unsalted butter

2 tablespoons dry white wine

1 sprig fresh thyme or ½ teaspoon dried thyme

½ teaspoon garlic powder

Coarse kosher salt and black pepper

1 teaspoon lemon juice (about 1/4 lemon)

8 ounces sour cream (1 cup), at room tempera-

ture

½ cup chopped chives (about 1 small bunch))

Optional: Potato chips, preferably sour cream and onion, for topping Shredded cheddar, for serving

PREPARATION

Step 1

In a 6- to 8-quart slow cooker, combine the potatoes, cauliflower, beans, onion, garlic, vegetable stock, butter, wine, thyme, garlic powder and 1½ teaspoons kosher salt. Cover and cook until the vegetables are very tender, about 8 hours on low. Alternately, in a Dutch oven, sauté onion and garlic in butter. Add the rest of the ingredients. Bring to low boil then cover and lower the temperature to simmer. Cook for 2-3 hours, until potatoes are soft.

Step 2

Remove and discard the thyme sprig, and turn off the slow cooker. Add the lemon juice. To make a completely smooth and creamy soup, purée the ingredients using an immersion blender. (Or, purée the soup in a blender in two batches, transferring the puréed soup to a different pot.) To make a textured, chunky soup, smash the ingredients using a potato masher in the slow cooker. Stir in the sour cream and chives. Taste and add additional salt if necessary. Serve in bowls topped with black pepper, crushed potato chips and shredded Cheddar. For leftovers, gently reheat the soup on the stovetop or in the microwave until it just barely bubbles around the edges; don't let it boil or the sour cream will break.
